Workshop Content Part 1.1: General Information on the EU-China NGO Twinning

The EU-China NGO Twinning program is an exchange program for the staff of European and Chinese NGOs. It aims at establishing sustainable partnerships and cooperation between non-governmental or non-profit organizations and think tanks from both regions.

“Twinning” Exchange – building partnerships through personal encounter

In the context of the EU-China NGO Twinning program, 14 European and Chinese NGOs working on similar thematic focuses will be paired up as “twinning-partners”. Each year, 7 exchange fellows working for European NGOs and 7 fellows from Chinese NGOs are given the opportunity to work and study for 4-8 weeks in their partner organization in the respective other region.

The program foresees that each twinning-partnership designs a joint project for concrete collaboration. The personal encounter of the NGO staff will lay the basis for future joint projects and stable partnerships between the two twinning partner organizations.

Mutual understanding, capacity building and long-term cooperation

China is becoming more and more important for working areas of European NGOs, but they often lack access to information and know-how on engagement in the Chinese society. The mutual exchange of staff will enable the missing information on Chinese developments to channel directly into important multiplier organizations in Europe.

At the same time, Chinese NGOs will get important insights into the working methods of European NGOs. This professionalization and internationalization will enable more Chinese NGOs and grassroots activists to participate in international debates and to develop a joint vision for a better future.

Mutual exchange, joint work on a common topic and experiencing working and civil society conditions in the respective other region will help to facilitate long-term cooperation between the twinning partner organizations.

中欧民间组织互换项目简介

中欧民间组织互换项目是欧洲和中国民间组织工作人员的交流项目。其目标是促进两个地区的民间组织或非营利性组织与智库之间建立可持续的合作伙伴关系与合作。

互换交流——通过人员互换建立合作伙伴关系

在中欧民间组织互换项目的推动下，14 家从事类似议题或领域的欧洲和中国民间组织将配对成为“互换伙伴”。每年将有 12 位欧洲民间组织的代表与 12 位中国民间组织的代表有机会互换到他们的伙伴组织的所在地去工作和学习 4 至 8 周的时间。

在这一互换项目下，预计每家互换伙伴组织将设计一项联合项目来开展具体合作。民间组织工作人员的交流互换将为两家互换伙伴组织之间简历稳定的合作伙伴关系及联合开发项目奠定基础。

相互理解、能力建设与长期合作

中国在欧洲民间组织的工作领域中占据着越来越重要的位置，但其往往缺乏适当渠道来获取中国社会的相关信息和专业知识。工作人员的互换则将帮助欧洲的重要民间组织直接获取中国发展动态的相关信息。

与此同时，中国民间组织将深入了解欧洲民间组织的工作方法。这种专业化和国际化将推动更多的中国民间组织与草根人士参与国际交流，共同建立更美好的未来愿景。

中欧民间组织之间的交流互换、共同议题的联合工作及工作和民间组织环境的体验，将促进互换伙伴组织之间的长期合作。

Part 1.3: Speakers, Twinning Participants and Organizer/ 发言嘉宾、互换伙伴和组织者

Roland Jöbstl (The European Environmental Bureau, EEB)

Mr. Roland Jöbstl has been working in the field of climate action in energy policies since 2007. He gathered experience as an analyst in the Austrian Federal Environmental Agency, and other institutions. Roland Jöbstl studied business computer science, as well as human and social ecology in Austria and Norway. Now leading the EEB's working group on energy and climate, he focuses on the role of energy efficiency in EU energy and climate policies.

Gerhard Köberlin (Stiftung Asienhaus)

Mr. Gerhard Köberlin worked as evangelical pastor in Bavaria. His work took him to Geneva and Hamburg. Due to his international ecumenically activities and his professional emphasis on Asian christianity, he worked as adviser in the field of religious studies at Mahidol University in Bangkok. 1992, Gerhard Köberlin became one of the co-founders of the „Asienhaus“. 1996, he co-founded a European network of Buddhist and Christian studies.

Liu Kaiyang (China NGO Network for International Exchanges, CNIE)

Mr. Liu Kaiyang is Deputy Secretary General at China NGO Network for International Exchanges (CNIE). He graduated from Peking University majoring in economics. His research areas include international politics, trade and international organizations.

Jonas Pohlfuß (EBC University of Düsseldorf)

Mr. Jonas Pohlfuß is an intercultural consultant with a focus on Asia and a professor of brand management and marketing at the EBC University of Düsseldorf. He advises European and Asian companies on how to improve their intercultural communication skills and team spirit. Mr. Pohlfuß helps organizations transform their own history into successful content strategies by drawing upon best practices in the fields of PR, marketing and IT.

Denis Petri (Volksentscheid Fahrrad)

The Berlin Bicycle Referendum is the world's first citizen-initiated cycling referendum. The initiative is passionately pursuing the goal of making Berlin more bicycle friendly by channeling popular support for a sustainable and healthy city. The Berlin Bicycle Referendum is the most recent initiative aiming to shape and influence urbanization processes in Berlin by means of direct democracy. Denis Petri works as a city guide. He studied chemistry, historical urban studies, and did research on the history of urban mobility.

Oliver Radtke (Robert Bosch Stiftung)

Mr. Oliver Radtke works as senior project manager China in the program area "International relations America and Asia" of the Robert Bosch Stiftung. The Robert Bosch Stiftung is one of the most renowned foundations in Germany. Associated with the Robert Bosch Company, it promotes external projects and initiates its own projects for developing and running programs. Oliver Radtke holds a master's degree in Modern Chinese Studies from Heidelberg University. Previously, he worked as a TV reporter in Singapore and China.

Dr. habil. Nora Sausmikat (Stiftung Asienhaus)

Dr. Nora Sausmikat is head of the China program at Stiftung Asienhaus and is also responsible for the EU-China NGO Twinning program. Dr. Sausmikat holds a post-PhD degree in Sinology. She studied Sinology, Political science, Anthropology, Tibetan language and Drama at Sichuan University in Chengdu, China and at Free University in Berlin. She works as a university lecturer for contemporary China, author and consultant for civil society projects, as well as for China-related media reports and programs. In her research, she specializes in political reform and political memory, as well as in civil society developments in China.

Wang Xiangyi (China Association for NGO Cooperation, CANGO)

Ms. Wang Xiangyi works as Assistant Executive Director at China Association for NGO Cooperation (CANGO). Furthermore, she's Focal Point Person of the China Civil Climate Action Network (CCAN) secretariat. Ms. Wang supported a total 86 representatives from 20 CCAN members and participated in the UNFCCC climate change conference to deliver Chinese NGO's voice. Since 2015, Ms. Wang is engaged in C20 and civil BRICS policy advocacy work, and participated in 2016 Qingdao C20 and the 2nd Civil BRICS in New Delhi.

Dr. Claudia Wendland (Women in Europe for a Common Future, WECF)

Dr. Claudia Wendland is a water and sanitation specialist at WECF and promotes re-use oriented water and sanitation projects worldwide. WECF has implemented water and sanitation projects in rural areas of 20 countries. Dr. Wendland's academical background is civil and environmental engineering. She finalised her doctoral thesis at Hamburg University of Technology about 'Anaerobic digestion of blackwater and kitchen refuse' as part of new sustainable sanitation concepts in 2008.

WWF Germany, Wadden Sea Office (Germany) & The Hong Kong Bird Watching Society (Hong Kong, China)

Exchange topics: "Environmental education and awareness raising as a critical factor for long term conservation of coastal wetlands" with a special focus on coastal birds

The **WWF Wadden Sea Office** is actively involved in the Trilateral Cooperation on the Protection of the Wadden Sea, is experienced in trans-boundary and cross-sectoral cooperation – among others within the framework of Interreg projects - and represents the nature NGO-sector in various international Wadden Sea World Heritage working groups. The office building in Husum hosts a National Park Visitor Centre and is shared by several NGOs.

Ms. Anja Szczesinski studied biology with a special focus on ecology and nature conservation at Goettingen University (Germany). In various national and international internships and training courses she gathered practical experience and additional qualification in environmental education and nature interpretation. Employed by Naturschutzgesellschaft Schutzstation Wattenmeer e.V., a German NGO, Ms. Szczesinski worked as a coordinator of the "International Wadden Sea School" (IWSS), a trans-boundary Wadden Sea education program by the Trilateral

Cooperation on the Protection of the Wadden Sea. Starting 2011 she has been working for WWF Germany as a program officer on Wadden Sea Protection

The **Hong Kong Bird Watching Society (HKBWS)** was founded in 1957. It is concerned about the appreciation and conservation of birds and their habitats and is one of the oldest membership-based-nongovernmental organizations in Hong Kong. For nearly 60 years, HKBWS has been promoting bird watching and carrying out educational activities, surveys and research; HKBWS also plays a leading role in regional bird monitoring initiatives such as coordinating the International Black-faced Spoonbill Census and helping to coordinate the China Coastal Waterbird Census. It also works closely with local bird watching societies and government agencies for the conservation of several highly threatened bird species in mainland China.

Ms. Vivian Fu obtained a Bachelors degree in Ecology and then specialized in Freshwater Ecology during her Masters studies at the University of Hong Kong. Following her graduation she worked as a research assistant in herpetology in Yunnan. Afterwards she joined the Hong Kong Bird Watching Society where she worked on diverse bird conservation projects, collaborating with Bird Life International and other global NGOs such as the WWF. She is now assistant manager at her organization.

Zero Waste Europe (Belgium) & Eco Canton (Guangzhou, China)

Exchange topics: Waste management – Spreading the understanding that waste is only the tip of the iceberg of a number of environmental and social issues. Therefore work on waste issues means as well working on climate change, food waste, air pollution, plastic pollution and other critical subtopics for both organizations.

Zero Waste Europe's mission is to empower communities and change agents from around Europe to redesign their relationship with resources and adapt their consumption patterns. Zero Waste Europe is both a knowledge network and an advocacy group, representing active communities in countries across the EU. The organization supports local groups with independent knowledge and steamlined tools to drive change more efficiently, structure the movement internationally to better represent the interests of our communities across the EU and engage policy makers with a unified voice. Zero Waste Europe wants to re-design our society so that all superfluous waste is eliminated and everything that is produced can be re-used, repaired composted or recycled back into the system.

Ms. Danuta Chodakowska received her Bachelors degree in Pedagogy from the University of Silesia in Poland. During her Master studies, she also partook in a study year at the Mugla University of Turkey while working on her degree in Philosophical Counseling and Coaching. She has been involved in various youth education programs like the *Academy of Future* and the *Projektor*. Starting out as a volunteer for Zero Waste Europe she quickly became a community leader in the organizations vast European network.

Eco Canton is focusing on household waste, waste classification and management, formally registered in 2012. We are also one of the initial institution of China Zero Waste Alliance. Eco Canton has cooperated with the government, enterprises, communities and other environmental organizations successfully to explore and practice a sustainable solution to address the waste crisis. They are pushing the government to implement the relevant waste

policies through policy advocacy, raising public awareness and participation. The vision is “A future of zero waste; an era of green citizens; a livable and ecofriendly Canton”.

Ms. Huang Liying obtained her Bachelors degree in the Administration of Public affairs at the School of Political Science and Law which is part of the Guangdong University of Technology. During her studies she supported different causes as a volunteer, e.g. the promotion of disaster relieve knowledge, the inclusion of disabled persons. She also became an intern at Eco Canton. Following graduation she immediately started to work for them as a project officer specializing in waste issues.

Esti People to People (Estonia) & Greenovation Hub (Guangzhou, China)

Exchange topics: Exploring public participation in the fair sharing of clean water and water consumption by using workshops and activities for awareness raising on water issues and designing promotional activities.

Eesti People to People designs and implements training courses and workshops for young people about water consumption and climate change including presentations, lectures, individual, peer and group work, reflection sessions, evaluations and monitoring.

Mr. Pavel Smulski received his BA and MA degree in Culture and Communication from the University of Nice in France. He worked in France, the US, and Brazil before he became a project manager and trainer for Eesti People to People in 2010. He is responsible for project cycle management in the area of youth education.

Greenovation Hub believes development should be ecological, and only by collaborative effort can environmental problems be solved. The organization supports public participation and joint power of civil society in environmental issues and provides innovation tools to enable public participating in environmental protection, especially for fostering youth power.

Ms. Chen Fan received her Bachelor of Law at the Southwest University of Political Science and Law and attended Strasbourg University as an exchange student while she acquired her Master of Law. She is a member of the Center for Study of Legal Sociology&Anthopology as well as the Low Carbon Development Committee of the Guangdong Society of Environmental Science. She has now been the director of the Guangzhou office for two years.

Change Partnership (Belgium) & South-Nord Institute for Sustainable Development SNISD (Beijing, China)

Exchange topics: Belt road initiative and climate change; clean technology; green financing and low-carbon investments

Change Partnership is a not-for-profit think tank and activist organization seeking to solve the political difficulties surrounding the climate change topic and to facilitate the transition to a clean, secure as well as prosperous world. Change Partnership creates innovative policy and political solutions as well as organizing, decision-makers in governments, businesses and civil society to ensure, that real as well as long-lasting change is achieved.

During her BA and MA studies in Oriental Languages and Civilizations at the “La Sapienza” University of Rome **Ms. Arianna Americo** traveled to China twice to partake in courses at the Beijing Foreign Studies University. She also attended an Executive Education Training Program at the Summer Law Institute of the Beijing University School of Government. After finishing her degree Ms. Americo interned at the Fair Trade Advocacy Office. 2016 she started working as a researcher at Change Partnership.

The **South-North Institute for Sustainable Development (SNISD)**, founded 1998, is a Chinese non-profit think & do tank with its mission to promote environmental protection and sustainable development in China and the Asia Pacific region, through international exchanges and cooperation. Over the past two decades focusing on clean energy, climate change, low-carbon and protected areas, as well as local community development and etc. SNISD has been strongly committed to addressing issues of public and government concerns through science-based and cross-sectoral approaches and in a collaborative manner.

After obtaining his Doctoral degree in Wildlife Conservation and Utilization at the Beijing Forestry University **Dr. Ge Xingfang** worked for several years in the field of environmental conservation. Following which she became a project coordinator in “Mine Ecology Restoration Research in the Inner Mongolia Grassland Area” and started participating in the “International Case Studies on National Park Systems and their implication for China”.

Youth Included (Czech Republic) & Evergreen Center for Sustainable Development (Beijing, China)

Exchange topics: Environmental protection; community development; community work, migrant communities; participation; youth work; social inclusion; festival management

Youth Included is a non-governmental organization, functioning as an open-space for young people who want to know more about people and cultures, learn new things and share their skills, inspire and be inspired. Youth Included believes that the youth is the key to building the future, therefore we all should give them the tools for education, raise their awareness in regards to the dangers of xenophobia and discrimination, show them the diversity of the World and point out the positive effects of intercultural interactions.

Ms. Ekaterina Kokkalou received her MA in Marketing from the Ural State Technical University in Russia and is working on her PhD thesis about Integration of Migrants at the University of Economics in Prague. She has been working as a lecturer and language teacher for several years before she worked as a project coordinator at the InBaze Community Centre. Ms. Kokkalou also engaged as a peer advisor for the International Organization for Migration and is Co-founder, President and project coordinator of Youth Included.

Evergreen Center for Sustainable Development (Evergreen) is a non-governmental organization that actively practices and promotes sustainable development while focusing on the healthy development of children. Furthermore, Evergreen’s areas of work include sustainable development education, research and international exchange.

After graduating from the University of International Relations in Beijing, **Mr. Xu Hangyu** took a gap year travelling by bike over 2000km through China. Visiting Hangzhou, Changsha, Chengdu and even the remote Tibet area. After returning to Beijing he started working as a project officer and eco-education teacher at Evergreen, trying to positively impact the city's environment for his newborn daughter.

WECF e.V. Women Engage for a Common Future (Germany) & Green Women (Shanghai, China)

Exchange topics: Experience exchange on management, organization and needed skills of environmental NGO's in Europe and China; exploring and developing gender-sensitive business model for steering citizen's towards decentralized, renewable and safe energy.

Women Engaged for a Common Future (WECF) are an international network of over 150 women's and civil society organizations implementing projects in 50 countries and advocating globally to shape a just and sustainable world; our Common Future. WECF was founded and registered following an initiative of European women at the 1992 Earth Summit, to work together for sustainable development and to give a voice and organization to the "Women Major Group" of Rio Agenda 21. WECF's philosophy of enabling local project partners and network members to implement projects together, to share experiences within the network and to learn from each other, soon proved to be successful.

Ms. Johanna Eichermüller received her BA degree in the Management of Renewable Energies in Munich. During her studies she joined WECF as an intern. She also took part in an exchange program with the City of Cape Town focused on climate mitigation and sustainable development. After her internship she stayed on as a freelance project coordinator for WECF.

Green Women is a grassroots NGO in Shanghai, which was established in June, 2010. Women's participation has been the unique label of the NGO. Through a series of low carbon community programs, including the collection and reuse of plastic waste, environmental protection, small garden development and so on. Green Women has attracted more and more family members to build ecological communities. Since 2010, we have organized over 240 environmental activities with no less than eighty thousand participants, and achieved domestic waste source reduction of more than 81 tons.

Ms. Wang Han obtained a Masters degree in Environmental Sociology. During her studies at the East China University of Science and Technology she engaged in various environmental protection events. After graduating she joined Green Women in Shanghai as a full time staff. For the last 3 years she has held the position of project assistant in this organization.

Center for Youth Activism CYA KRIK (Macedonia) & Guangzhou Yuexiu District Nurturing Relationship Education Support Centre NRC (Guangzhou, China)

Exchange topics: Disability, gender and sexuality. Providing direct support to people and children with disabilities and continuing advocacy towards decision makers and service providers to better fulfill the needs of people with disabilities

Centre for youth activism KRIK is non-governmental, non-profit organization established by young people, led by young people and it works for and with young people. The translation of the word KRIK is SCREECH/OUTCRY and the inspiration for it came out of the vision of this organization, which is to be the voice of the youth that will be heard and will make changes and contributions to society. KRIK strives to encourage greater youth participation, youth activism, and hopes that young people can be more included in the policy making process on local and national level.

„The Schlumpers“

The Schlumpers are an artists' group founded in 1980 by the Hamburg artist Rolf Laute (1940–2013). The origin of the Schlumper group came from an idea Rolf Laute had for a wall painting in the Wilfried Borck House at the Alsterdorf institute for the handicapped to be created with the participation of some of the house's artistically talented residents. Today, this group of artists, with differing handicaps and individual artistic attitudes, is celebrated internationally. Self-determination and free artistic activity are the group's basic principles. The German name "Die Schlumper" comes from the name of the Hamburg street "Beim Schlump" where the artists' first studio was located.

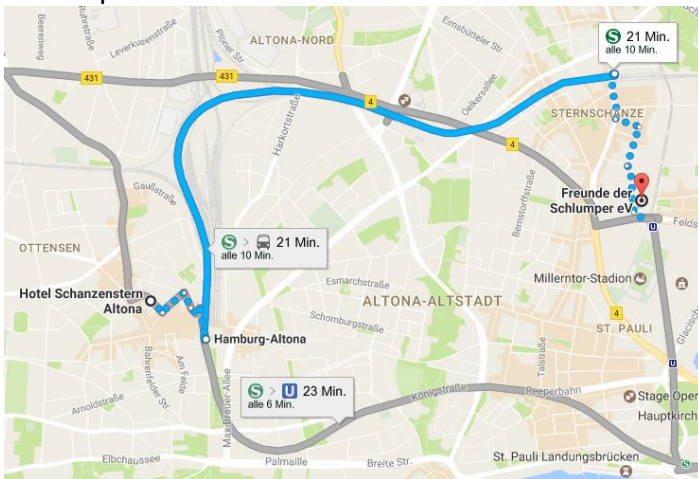
With the help of the sponsoring organization "Friends of the Schlumpers", established in 1985, and the Hamburg Ministry for Labor, Health, and Social Welfare, the work project "Schlumper by Profession" was begun in 1993. Through the merger of the sponsoring organization and the "alsterarbeit gGmbH" of the Alsterdorf Evangelical Foundation in 2002, the currently 30 artists continue to have their permanent studio in the old Hamburg meatpacking hall on the Feldstrasse.

In addition to the artists' work areas, there are also exhibitions of the artists' current work in the studio, which may be viewed and purchased on Saturdays without prior appointment.

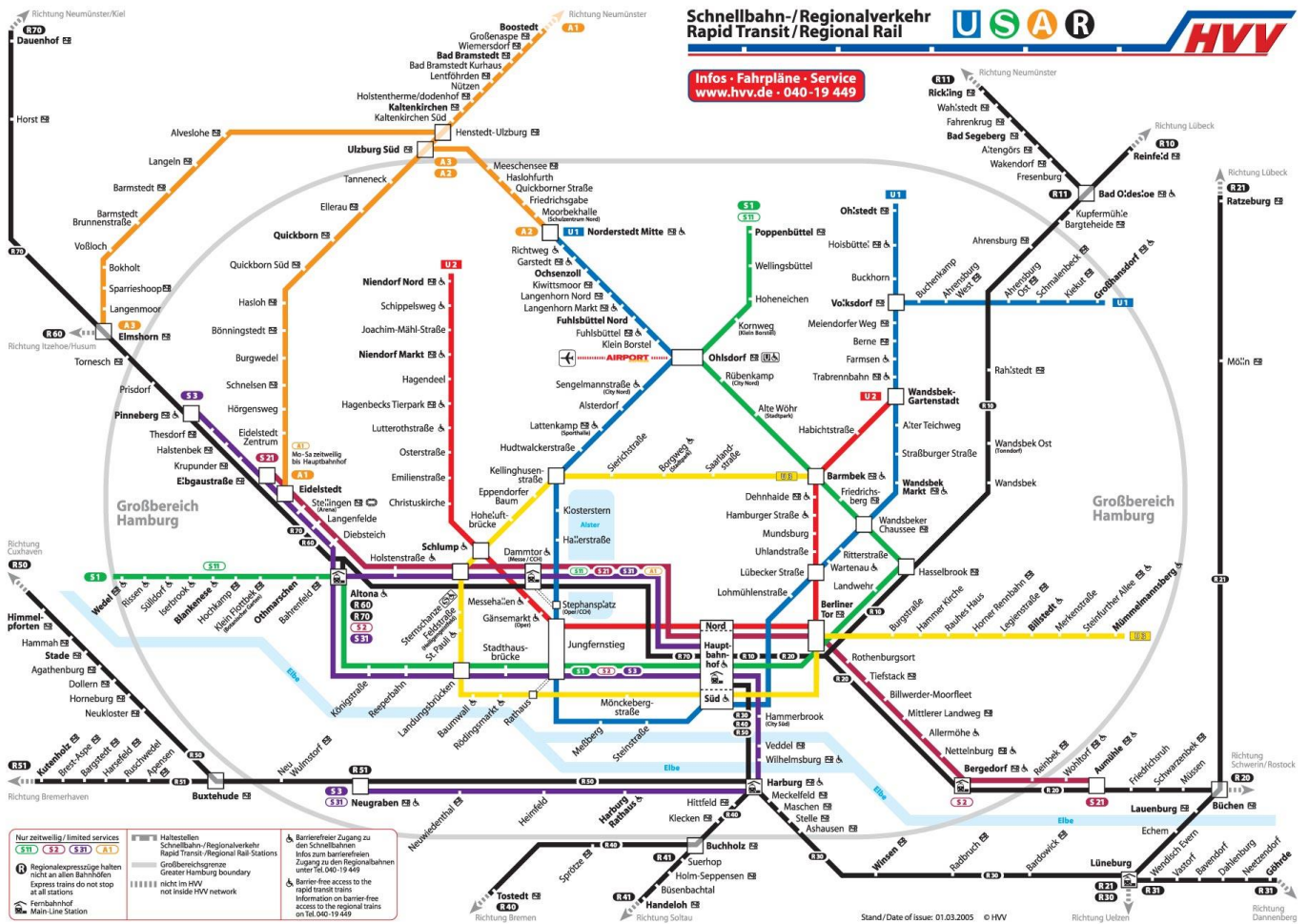
